CHOOSING A COURSE

There's lots of choice so it's important to do your research. Make sure it's something you'll enjoy, it's a long time.



YOU MIGHT WANT TO CONSIDER:

- > is the course accredited?
- > what modules will I study?
- > what are the facilities like?
- > what careers can I go into?
- > how long is the course?

SELECTING A UNIVERSITY

When selecting a university you need to ensure you'll feel happy, comfortable and safe there.

ASK YOURSELF:

- > do I want a big city centre campus or something a bit smaller?

- > what are the communal facilities such as the library and students' union like?

- > are there good transport links to the university?

- > what is the cost of living like?

- > how far away is the accommodation?

MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR OPEN DAY VISITS

OPEN DAYS ARE A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO GET A REAL FEEL FOR THE UNIVERSITY.

MAKE SURE YOU:

- > speak to academic staff so you get to know the ins and outs of your course
- > take a campus tour to get a feel for the campus and facilities
- > visit the accommodation to make sure you can see yourself living there
- > take a good look at the facilities and compare them to other universities
- > speak to current students for their opinions.

S

Start early

T

Take a look at the advice on the UCAS and university websites

A

Avoid using clichés like ‘ever since I was a child...’

T

Think about what relevant skills, experience and qualities you have

E

Evidence – always give examples of using the skills you mention and say how they are relevant

M

Make sure you understand what is required to study the course

E

Enthusiasm – explain why you are interested in the subject

N

Never copy text from elsewhere – it will be checked electronically for plagiarism

T

Take your time and ask someone to check it for you

S

Spelling and grammar must be accurate

I

Important documents – bring everything you need

N

Never be late – arrive 30 minutes early to allow time to settle in

T

Take a copy of your personal statement and make sure it's fresh in your mind

E

Ensure you prepare a couple of questions to show you've done your research

R

Remember to dress smartly – it shows you are taking it seriously

V

Voice – speak clearly, confidently and enthusiastically

I

Is your body language positive? Make eye contact and don't slouch

E

Enjoy it – it's your time to shine

W

What made you want to apply to Teesside University? Remind yourself.

S

Stay calm and be yourself

REVISION

TOP TIPS

Get prepared and be ahead of the game:

- > devise a revision timetable and start early

- > revise in short manageable chunks

- > be organised with your revision notes; use folders, post-it notes and coloured pens

- > look through past exam papers to get a feel for the format

- > create a good environment to revise in, avoiding distractions like the TV

- > switch off your phone – no calls, social media or internet

- > relax – it's just as important to have time to relax and recuperate after revising

- > have an early night before an exam, keep hydrated and don't cram.

STUDENT FINANCE

Do you have any questions about university funding?

HERE ARE SOME KEY FACTS:

- > you don't pay anything up front – tuition fee loans can cover the full cost of your fees
- > you only pay your loans back once you've graduated and start earning more than £25,000 a year
- > it's not like a bank loan – how much you pay depends on what you earn, not the amount that has been borrowed
- > there are lots of scholarships and bursaries out there for you to access, visit **tees.ac.uk/funding**.
