Kuala Lumpur

1. Petronas Twin Tower & KLCC

Petronas Twin Towers, the 88-storey buildings were designed by Cesar Pelli & Associates with both towers joined at the 41st and 42nd floors (175m above street level) by a 58 metre-long, double-decker Sky Bridge. Located in the KL city centre, the Petronas Twin Towers' architecture is Islamic-inspired and the buildings primarily house the corporate headquarters of the Petronas Company and other offices.





2. Batu Caves

Batu Caves is a limestone hill comprising three major caves and a number of smaller ones. Incorporated with interior limestone formations said to be around 400 million years old, the temple is considered an important religious landmark by Hindus. Cathedral Cave – the largest and most popular cavern in Batu Caves – houses several Hindu shrines beneath its 100-metre-high arched ceiling. At the foot of Batu Hill are two other cave temples – the Art Gallery Cave and Museum Cave – which houses numerous Hindu statues and paintings.

3. Sultan Abdul Samad Building

The Sultan Abdul Samad Building is among Kuala Lumpur's earliest Moorish-style buildings. It is set to the east of Merdeka Square (Dataran Merdeka) and the Royal Selangor Club, across from Jalan Sultan Hishamuddin. It was built in 1897 and was named after the reigning sultan of Selangor at the time. The distinguished landmark originally served as the secretariat for the colonial British administration.





4. Central Market

Central Market, built in 1928, it used to be a simple wet market but in the early 1980s was revamped into a handicrafts outlet. The focus for the city's artistic community, inside the building is a warren of boutiques, handicraft and souvenir stalls with traders selling local merchandise such as authentic Malaysian batik prints and more.





5. Thean Hou Temple

Thean Hou Temple is one of the oldest and largest temples in Southeast Asia. Overlooking the Federal highway, the six-tiered Buddhist temple is also known as the Temple of the Goddess of Heaven. Dedicated to Tian Hou, a goddess said to protect fishermen, the temple is also a shrine where many come to worship Guan Yin, the Goddess of Mercy. Built by KL's Hainanese community in 1894, it is set on a hill and offers wonderful views of the city.



6. Royal Selangor Visitor Centre

Royal Selangor Visitor Centre possesses a long history dated back to the year of 1885. It is well known for its high quality craftsmanship in terms of pewter which makes good gifts and home decorations for individuals all over the world. The museum features various items and equipments and there is also the factory which presents to visitors the process of producing these high quality pewter products.



Melaka

1. A' Famosa Fort

Built in 1511, the settlement used to sprawl across a whole hillside but now only a lone gate (Porta de Santiago) remains. One of the oldest surviving European architectural remains in Asia.



2. Christ Church

Christ Church built by the Dutch when they took possession of Malacca from the Portuguese, it's one of Malacca's most defining structures. Christ Church was built in 1753 to celebrate a century of Dutch occupation. The interior of the cathedral has 200 year-old handmade pews, decorative fanlights and plaques that honour Dutch soldiers and locals.

3. St. Paul's Church

The St. Paul's Church is at the summit of St. Paul's Hill. Built on the site of the last Malaccan sultan's istana (palace), it was constructed by Portuguese fidalgo (nobleman) captain, Duarte Coelho, in gratitude to the Virgin Mary for saving his life during a storm at sea. Roofless and covered in ferns, it was originally called the Nossa Senhora da Annunciada.




4. Jonker Street










AREA MAP
